Presidents Message

In late summer, I sent out a survey through SurveyMonkey to get a feel for how college/university summer programs performed in 2016. The survey was sent to 845 institutions, and as is usually the case, the return was pretty low so the results are by no means representative. Overall, respondents indicated an increase from 2015 in terms of credit hours taken during the summer with schools reporting increases as high as 12-14% and most in the range of 3-6%. A couple reported small declines.

Among respondents, the number of students taking one or more summer classes for academic credit ranged from 140 students to 16,360 students. This wide range reflects the varying sizes of institutions surveyed. Numbers reported tended to represent the entire college/university with a few indicating the number of students reported does not include all summer students, suggesting a decentralized summer program at those institutions. Non-credit-bearing summer programs were excluded, and all but one respondent was a member of NAASS.

The majority of respondents indicated that the increases in credit hours taken during the summer could be attributed to an increase in the number of online and/or hybrid courses offered during the summer. Many respondents stated online courses were popular among students and were often filled to capacity. Some respondents suggested other factors that they believe also contributed to the increase in summer enrollment. The following are examples:

Purdue experienced record growth in summer credit hours taken and the University attributed this success to a newly instituted bridge program along with three other targeted pilots aimed at heavy data analysis and scholarships provided to select students.

> Rutgers University at New Brunswick secured funding for nearly 80 summer scholarships and implemented a social media campaign/contest, both of which have been credited with helping increase summer enrollment.

- Colorado State University offered nonresident students a discount for their first three credits of an online summer course and, in turn, saw an increase in enrollment among those students.
- The University of California Berkeley offered a "Summer Only Minor" Program in order to increase summer enrollment. The university's "Summer Minor in Journalism" was deemed a big success with 395 enrollments in six courses.

Overall, it appears colleges/universities experienced an increase in summer enrollment from 2015 to 2016 with expanded online/hybrid offerings and unique course offerings being the main factors attributed to the increase.
